About Our Event



G.A.S. Research Associates invite visitors to participate in a reading session developed in response to Archival Consciousness, mentors of the Annotations Research Programme. Archival Consciousness was initiated by artist Mariana Lanari and graphic designer Remco Van Bladel to collaborate with libraries and archives in cultural institutions. They work closely with archivists to implement methods and infrastructure to make their collections more accessible.

The research associates will be utilising an archival mobile unit influenced by Archival Consciousness' Silverfish model. The model investigates the daily practices of archiving and the slow construction of site-specific collective memory infrastructures in libraries and archives of cultural institutes. The associates will be inviting the participants to engage with their own version of the Silverfish model in a live archiving session. The live archiving session will involve the participants engaging with the

materials on camera and also invites participants to make annotations of the text or material they encounter during the session.

Taking the literary and visual traces of the Pan-African Festivals and incorporating Archival Consciousness' methodology of documenting interactions with archival and literary material, the reading session invites artists, researchers, archivists and interested persons to G.A.S. Foundation to interact with reading materials selected by the Research Associates and contribute variegated annotations to a chosen text. Ephemera from the session will later be displayed at the Associate's Open Research Room.
